Rest assured there is going to be some mention of the last time BYU and SMU squared (the Holiday Bowl featuring Jim McMahon at QB for the Cougs and the Pony Express backfield for Meyer's Mustangs. Even the Jimmy Kimmel LA Bowl is not immune to the dreaded bowl opt-outs, which see Mountain West Fresno for this duel in Inglewood. The Cougs' defense will be missing its bowl not because of Kimmel but rather to prep for the NFL Draft. That's after the Wazzu I transfer portal, which claimed Francisco Mauigoa and Travion Brown – co-starters at mid coaches, as d.c. Brian Ward left the program recently to take the same job at Arizona State as well. Moreover, top wideouts De'Zhaun Stribling and Donovan Ollie, who combined for 10 have entered the transfer portal. Connecticut definitely piques our interest in this one, as the Huskies haven't been to a bowl game (Marshall has been to a bowl game in Peterburg, as it happens), as HC Jim Mora has rescued the program from a very dark place in the last three years. Mind you, things didn't look so rosy for Mora and the Huskies at the end of last season, with a 1-11 record and a victory coming against Central Connecticut State and had been outscored 45-11 in the first half. The team lost its best offensive players plus assorted others to injuries within the first few weeks. Then true freshman QB Victor Rosa stepped in when workhorse vet RB Nate Carter was KO'd for the season by a concussion and 12 TDs. Now, the Huskies ranked 124th in total offense (302 ypg) and 115th in scoring offense (23 ppg) with 326 ypg including 211 ypg on the ground and 5.3 ypc in the air. The team has a lot of talent and prize for the Connecticut players and coaches, who should be excited about the upcoming season with wins over Old Dominion (12-0), Appalachian State (28-21), Georgia Southern (23-10) and North Carolina (28-10). RS frosh Cam Fancher (1450 YP, 56%, 8-5 ratio) eventually took over the QB job from Victor Rosa, and last year's star RB Rasheen Ali played in only the final two games.
